Welcome to the Derwent Valley Mills World Heritage Site; a place to inspire you to explore, create, think, learn, experience and do!

The mills built here were the world's first factories using cotton or silk to make thread. Water wheels and water-power were used to drive new machinery on a large scale for the first time anywhere

in the world. The mills needed many workers, so the mill owners built houses then schools, shops and churches to attract a workforce to the area. At first goods were moved about by road using packhorses and carts; later, canals and railways moved goods faster. All of this remains for you to explore today.

We want to share with you the wide range of options available to schools along this important 15 mile site. Our key attractions are featured inside this booklet and on the back you'll find a map and contact details to help you plan your visit.

Why not travel by train?



It's really easy to visit the sites by train including activities to do on the journey. School and College groups of 10 or more, travelling on the train service between Derby and Matlock can benefit from a 26% discount on standard rail fares. For group fares, child rate is 5 to 17 years old on local journeys.

Cromford Mills

Cromford Mills was the birthplace of the modern factory system and the world's first successful water-powered cotton spinning mill. Today it is a site of history and innovation where young people can learn about Georgian history as well as green energy and geography.

Our on-site education sessions are curriculum focused and targeted for Key Stages 1, 2 or 3. Get hands-on and learn about life as a mill worker, discover how Sir Richard Arkwright changed the world, explore green energy building Lego waterwheels, and explore the geography of the local area.



Masson Mills, Matlock Bath

Clock in to a shift at Masson Mills and step back in time as you enter Sir Richard Arkwright's 1783 water powered cotton spinning mill. Explore a huge collection of historic textile machinery and experience the sights, sounds and smells of what it was like to work in a textile mill during the Industrial Revolution. Discover how fabric is woven, string is made and experience our magnificent steam engine in operation. Our school tours can be tailored to your curriculum topic, include activities along the way and rooms are available for self guided activities and lunch.




Strutt's North Mill, Belper
